

GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS

The Sri Lanka Forester is a scientific journal published by the Sri Lanka Forest Department and devoted to forestry (in a broad sense) in Sri Lanka. Articles are published subjected to the approval of the Editorial Board whose current members are listed in the front pages of each issue. Particular articles may also be submitted to appropriate scientific referees. Acceptance does not imply that any opinions expressed by the authors are shared by the Board, Forest Department, or the Government of Sri Lanka. Articles are subjected to editing; the final version will usually be sent to the author, or to one of the authors for approval before printing.

Articles must be originals. If they have been published elsewhere, either in the same or another language, or if there is any intention of submitting them for publication elsewhere, this must be stated. Generally they should record the results of new studies; this may include reviews or compilations of older work by same authors or by others. Quotations, or the incorporation of parts of other peoples work must always be acknowledged and permission obtained when appropriate.

Your article must be in accordance with our format. It may contain an Abstract/ Summary, Introduction, Methodology, Results, Discussion, Conclusion, Acknowledgements & References.

Articles may vary in length between 3500-4000 words. It should be submitted in a CD preferably in MS word format. You may also e-mail your article to researchdiri@gmail.com Illustrations of all kinds (photographs, drawings, maps, graphs, tables) can be printed and their use is encouraged, except that for reasons of economy colour should only be used if it serves a purpose. All of these should be prepared in such a way that they can easily be fitted to B5 page size.
